Horticulture Assessment in Central America

- Funded by Bureau for Latin America and the Carribbean
- Team of experts hired
 - One on one interviews and site visits
 - Workshops in Honduras and Guatemala
 - Survey
- Constraints and opportunities for the horticulture sector
- Research needs and recommendations prioritized

Engaging U.S. graduate students in international development

The Model

- Small-scale developing world organizations identify a problem facing local farmers
- Trellis Fund matches organizations with a graduate student with relevant skills







Goals

- Organizations are able to extend new ideas and technologies to their communities
- Graduate students gain hands-on experience in international development
- Organizations and graduate students form a long-term connection

Trellis Achievements

- Currently in year 2, 15 projects and students selected for year 3.
- Years 1 and 2: 24 projects in 11 countries
- } Year 1:
 - 124 training and extension meetings
 - 1935 farmers trained (1492 women)
 - 10 demonstration plots
- Project topics include horticultural production, irrigation, gender, economics, education, postharvest, plant pathology, and more.





Student Involvement

39 students from UC Davis, North Carolina State University, Cornell University and University of Hawai'i-Mano'a participated in Trellis over 3 years
